TAMIAMI-80 CELEBRATION



Saturday, April 26, was a beautiful day for a celebration. We were honored by many visiting dignitaries from around the state and further away. "Barry" Collier III traveled from his home in Ohio to serve as the Grand Marshal of the parade. He also read the speech his grandfather made on that very same date in 1928 for the opening of the Trail.

The parade of about 30 antique cars from the Naples-Marco Island Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America was joined by a Dixieland Band playing 1920's music including the "Tamiami Trail" song. Everglades City School had a float along with Boy Scouts, motorbikes from ABATE, mounted and motorized Sheriff's Department units, and our own Fire Department.



The Opening Ceremonies, on the steps of City Hall, began with the National Anthem sung by some of Betty Oglesby's ECity School music students and an invocation by Bishop Morris Dantin. Mayor Sammy Hamilton welcomed everyone and speeches followed by Congressman Mario Diaz-Balart, County Commissioner Jim Coletta, DOT District One Secretary Stan Cann, and Collier County Museums Director Ron Jamro. After the Collier speech, the new McLeod monument on the circle was unveiled by McLeod's grandchildren James D. Brown and Eileen Eismo.



Throughout the day there were arts & crafts booths, local food vendors, Boy Scout demonstrations, and live music on the stage. The Marco Historical Players performed; Bill Perdichizzi (seen here during the parade) was dressed as Barron Collier, Betsy Perdichizzi portrayed Tommie Barfield ("The Queen of Marco") who was a great friend of Collier and lobbied for his new county; and Marion Nicolay was a realistic Deaconess Bedell.

In the Museum, visitors heard talks about the Bay City Walking Dredge and Monroe Station. We counted over 1000 people through the door (!) so we estimate that many more attended the festivities in the park. The day ended with birthday cake for all.

TAMIAMI-80 CELEBRATION



Sunday, April 27, was another beautiful day and we concentrated on celebrating the Museum's 10th Birthday. The Opening Ceremonies started with the invocation by Rev. Jane Wallace and the National Anthem sung by Terri Rementeria. Mayor Sammy Hamilton welcomed everyone. He was followed by speeches from Bonnie Deaborn of the Division of Historic Resources at the Florida Department of State (who gave the Friends the grant to restore the old Laundry Building in 1998), Collier County Museums Director Ron Jamro, and Jack Geist from St Stephens Episcopal Church in Coconut Grove who have spearheaded the move to have a feast day for Deaconess Bedell.

Joe Stem continued to perform as "MC" on stage as live music continued. The Arts & Crafts and food vendors were active under the Pavilion. In the Museum there was "story-telling". Arita Hoffman Parker, Barbara Hoffman Daniels, and June Jolley Dyches told the audience what they remembered about the Deaconess, prompted by a slide show moderated by Marya Repko. Jack Geist joined in to explain how his church is establishing January 8 as her special day.



After the drawing for the raffle (see front page), everyone enjoyed the wonderfully-decorated chocolate and vanilla cakes.

Everyone agreed that the birthday party was a huge success!
